## Developing a focused explainer topic

As I've been reading through others' suggested additions to our canon, here are some issues that especially interest me:

- linguistic distance, as highlighted in Mike's article on football, explored with a wider lens
- intersection between linguistic diversity and sign language (inspo from Michaela's blog)
- receptive diversity and how it applies to countries with larger populations such as
  India (Issac's article)

Here are some ways in which these issues connect to other things we've read and/or to prior interests I have:

- The topics above expand my research interests in linguistic diversity which Mike especially touches on describing how more culturally and thus language diverse teams perform better
- Michaela's media element on Elise Roy raised awareness for whom I consider when discussing language i.e. thinking about deaf people who do not process the same communication style language-typical groups have
- Lera Boroditsky (TEDTalk I chose) described how bias/ narrow our research is (i.e. usually based on American English-speaking undergraduates) which prompts my interest in exploring studies from other perspectives/ contexts such as in India
  - similarly, my research article noted this limitation and direction for future research including investigating if their current study could be generalizable to other cultural contexts/ a more homogenous country (e.g. Japan)
