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The article "LGBTQ Americans Aren't Fully Protected from Discrimination in 29 States" contains a map at that top with a key. The map is labeled through the key which states have full LGBT non-discrimination protection, some LGBT non-discrimination protection, non-discrimination laws that lack gender identity protection, and which states have no LGBT non-discrimination protections. When you click on a state you get more information about the laws in that state or if you scroll down, you see each group of states and can click on them from there. Each page about the individual state gives more details and information regarding what laws that state enforces and if they are on any path to creating more laws and regulations.

This source was easily my favorite source that I have in my portfolio. Each source has something different to contribute to my argument but most of them fall under the same category. This source is the most different, it's interactive and educational and it does not give a perspective. It reports on the laws and what is happening in each state regarding LGBT discrimination protections. I think that when reporting and arguing on topics as serious as discrimination it is important to hear about it and its information from a non-bias source. Most of my sources supported my argument and contained ideas that argued it and allowed me to counter them, but this source gives the straight facts which is important to be aware of to argue any side to an argument.
