Reflection

For my portfolio I had in mind the topic of historical education diversity for some time, but I had to figure out how I can connect the wider topic to organizational structure. That is why I placed an emphasis on changing the curriculum as a possible solution, and I believe that while this project is not a big one compared to my thesis, it will play a huge role in shaping my future when I engage more indepth in historical education in real life.

As I started my research into the sources and topics that will suit this paper, I realized that there were many articles and journals that showed points that I never thought of before. From terms such as indigenism and the idea of the target of the historical topic telling the reader their own history, I knew I had to include a lot more views and opinions on this subject matter by more experienced historians and authors in the field of historical education.
